# GOLD RUSH: LOCAL FARMER POWERS THROUGH MASTERS GAMES

Gordonvale canefarmer Andrew Greenwood brought home two gold medals from the 2025 Great Barrier Reef Masters Games held in Cairns, where more than 2,000 athletes from Australia, Oceania, and Southeast Asia gathered to compete.

A dedicated member of 360 Fitness in Gordonvale, Andrew was inspired to compete when he heard that Indoor Rowing would be featured for the first time in the Games. Already maintaining a strong fitness routine through regular gym classes, he stepped up his training with the support of coach Caren Moule and the top-quality equipment at 360 Fitness.

Focusing on rowing for six weeks in the lead-up to the event, Andrew trained two to three times a week to refine his form and build endurance. Competing in the Male 61–70 age category, he achieved impressive times of 7:45 in the 2000m and 20:27 in the 5000m indoor rowing events—earning gold medals in both.

His performance has encouraged him to continue seeking new opportunities to further develop his fitness.

Andrew is appreciative of the unwavering support from his wife Nadine and the encouragement from the members of 360 Fitness. Their belief in his abilities and their motivation played an important role in his success.

Townsville is 25,000. Statistics concerning Gordonvale showed that the town, within a radius of three miles, had a population of 2000, and that a thousand people travelled there per month, by rail. There were five hotels, with a total of 63 rooms, of which eleven are available to residents in and travellers through the district.

Our town is still progressing. New buildings continue going up. Another-motor garage is being built, in which Messrs. Griffin Bros., late of Ensland and experienced in garage work, will carry on the business of repairing and selling motor cars. Their garage will be the fourth that Gordonvale can boast of.

At a recent land sale of perpetual leases a f acre block of land in the suburbs was sold for £430. Other facre blocks on the cutskirts of the town and on the Riverstone road were sold for as much as £200. Fullding allotments are very scarce here. With the rapid growth and prosperity of our town, building sites are in keen demand, and something should be done to supply it.

#### STREETS AHEAD

This column provides a background to the streets and infrastructure of Gordonvale and who or what they were named after Column compiled by Julie Amadio- Mulgrave Shire Historical Society

#### **Blackwell Street**

This street in Gordonvale was named after Richard Blackwell, one of the first settlers of this district.

Richard was born in St Just, Cornwall England in 1841. He was the son of Richard and Mary Blackwell (nee Olds). His working career started at the age of six working alongside his father in local underground tin mines in Cornwall. As a result, he had limited education and could not read or write. This did not stop this courageous, adventurous, and very hard-working man to achieve so much in his life.

At the age of twenty, Richard left England to seek his fortune. He travelled to British Columbia, Canada in 1861 on hearing of the Cariboo gold rush. After some time, he migrated to Australia, eventually arriving at Mt Perry, which is 100km west of Bundaberg. Mt Perry was renowned for its copper deposits, but there had also been a gold strike and Richard was keen to make a claim.

He met his life-long friend, business associate and soon to be father-in-law William Saunders Alley there. Richard married WS Alley's daughter Sarah Ann Alley on January 4th, 1873, in Blackall central Queensland.

In 1877-78 Richard, with his wife Sarah and brother-in-law George Gorham Alley aged fifteen, travelled overland by dray from the Mt Perry goldfields to Brisbane. They proceeded to Cooktown by ship and then on to the Hodgkinson and Palmer River goldfields. Sarah was the first woman to ride a horse from the Hann Tableland to the coast. Richard, William, and his son George were cedar getters and were felling timber on the Barron River in 1878 and then also made it through to the Mulgrave River that same year with Sarah being the first woman to ride across the Mulgrave River.

Richard Blackwell, on 18th October 1879, applied for a land grant and took up land in the Mulgrave area known as Plain Camp, near where Gordonvale is located today. By 1881, William Saunders Alley had established his Riverstone Hotel. The hotel business serviced the local settlers and the tin miners on the busy Robson Track to and from the Herberton tin mines.

Richard Blackwell, being the entrepreneur that he was, commenced a stagecoach run delivering mail and passengers between Riverstone and Cairns. In 1884, Richard received his Deed of Grant for his land, and his signature is documented with an 'X'. As Richard was illiterate, it was widespread practice of the times that documents were legally binding if the witness could sign their name.

In 1893 the Queensland Government passed 'The Sugar Works Guarantee Act' which enabled the erection of Central mills. The Mulgrave Central Mill Company Ltd was the first company registered under the agreement. The ever-progressive Richard Blackwell gifted part of his land for the establishment of the Mulgrave Mill. Richard and his brother-in-law George Alley sourced cane plants from Hambledon to develop their cane farms, and the Blackwell-Alley family were among the first mill suppliers when the mill started crushing in 1896. Richard Blackwell was a mill director from 1896 to 1920. After the death of William Saunders Alley in 1889, Richard and Sarah Blackwell took over the Riverstone Hotel and continued the tradition of warm hospitality, comfortable lodgings, and excellent cuisine.

Richard and Sarah Blackwell had no children of their own but had adopted an infant son who they named Willie. Tragically Willie

died at the age of eleven months. Richard died suddenly on a business/pleasure trip to Sydney in May 1920 aged seventy-nine years and was buried in Waverley cemetery near Sydney NSW. Sarah Blackwell died at the age of seventy-two years and is buried in the Alley family plot alongside the Gillies Range Road. Her son Willie, her parents William Saunders Alley and Mary Alley (nee Banks), her brother George Alley and his wife Mary Ellen also rest there.

The Alley and Blackwell families were the first European Settlers in the Mulgrave Valley and were true pioneers in every sense of the word. Many of their descendants still live in the area today.

Facilities include a public dump point, an onsite Custodian for guest support, and access to nearby public toilets and coin-operated showers. The campground is also within easy walking distance of Gordonvale's shopping centre, making it a convenient and relaxing place to stay.

#### Highly trained local volunteers provide emergency services

One of the many safety and support services provided by the Gordonvale SES (State Emergency Service) includes crucial involvement in the Great Pyramid Race to be held on August 2.

Crews of highly trained volunteers from the local SES will be placed at the bottom, middle and top of the Pyramid to monitor the runners,

provide first aid, moral support and do rescues if necessary.

Their role includes contacting other emergency services such as the police or ambulance if required. The SES teams will check in the runners at the start and finish of the race.

The SES is a government funded emergency service that prepares for and responds to emergencies across Queensland 24 hours a day. Gordonvale SES Controller, Dr. Steven Schwartz, said that approximately half of the Gordonvale unit's call-outs involved storm based operations. 'Our unit was heavily involved in rescue and clean-up operations linked to Cyclone Jasper and Cyclone Alfred', Steve said.

Cyclone Jasper, which hit Far North Queensland in December 2023, was the wettest tropical cyclone in Australian history.

'Our unit has been involved in rescues from Bamaga to all over the Cape, Bartle Frere and Ingham'.

'Driving flood boats, evacuating flood victims, repairing storm damage and sandbagging are some of the skill sets necessary for our members'. Steve said.

'Conducting land searches, chain saw use and tarpaulin erection are also part of our skill set'.

'The most important requirement by far is to turn up', he quipped. 'We can train anyone provided they have a positive attitude. There are no set criteria to become a member of the SES. However, prospective members must have a Blue Card and undergo a criminal history check'.

Steve stressed that the SES is an inclusive service. 'Similar tasks are required of our male and female members. There are currently more males than females in our unit. Our oldest member is sixty-eight and our youngest seventeen'.

Steve said the Gordonvale SES is a closely-knit unit. We liaise closely with other local emergency services including the police, ambulance and fire brigade'.


#### **GOLDEN KEV STILL MAKING WAVES**



The Great Northern Hotel, formerly known as the Queen's Hotel, was opened in 1912 by Edith Baird. According to a Cairns Post article: The building is of brick and two storied. Baths and parlours are to be found upstairs and down.

The brick walls throughout are fitted with Venita patent ventilators. The floors are covered with bright patterned carpet and linoleum which with the superior ventilation and a pleasing French grey tint of the walls make the place an ideal tropical resort, delightfully cool and bright.

Being under the patronage of the Commercial Travellers Association, a set of generous sized and bright sample rooms are added. Cuisine and catering are quite in keeping with all the appurtenances of the place which arc those of first-class modern hostelry.

In 1913, the architect Harvey Draper called for tenders for the construction of an

additional wing in brick, to the Queen's Hotel, Nelson, for Mrs Moller. This wing contained 10 bedrooms and additional balconies. The hotel continued to trade under the name of the Queens Hotel until approximately 1949, when a meeting of the Gordonvale Amateur Fishing Club and other sporting clubs advertised their meetings were to be held at the Great Northern Hotel.

#### **CAIRNS WATER SECURITY STAGE 1 PROJECT UPDATE**

The concrete works for the water treatment plant are now complete, marking a significant milestone for the project. More than 1,300 cubic metres of concrete was used to construct this vital piece of infrastructure.

Pipeline installation between Aloomba, Behana Gorge Road, and Gordonvale township is now in full swing, with approximately 1.8 kilometres of pipe laid to date. Where possible the pipeline has been adjusted to minimise the impact on trees; however, in some areas, there is no safe or practical way to build around them.

Cairns Regional Council are currently developing a tree planting scope of works with different options for consideration, including options like tree types, locations, and number of trees. Once developed, a recommendation will be made to Council including the procurement and planting approach.

The community will be kept informed throughout the construction phase and our team will work closely with residents who may be affected by these works.

#### **New Fire Trucks and Firefighters**

On behalf of the Honourable Ann Leahy MP, Minister for Local Government and Water, Minister for Fire, Disaster Recovery and Volunteers, I was present to hand over two fire trucks to our dedicated Rural Fire Service Queensland volunteer members in Yarrabah and our hard-working Queensland Fire and Rescue firefighters in Atherton, as well as attending the graduation ceremony for local firefighters.

The Yarrabah vehicle was a 2024 Isuzu Medium Attack worth \$400,000. It improves the Brigade's response capability by providing seating for five individuals, increased storage capacity, and a portable refrigerator for cold drinking water. It has an added safety feature of a cabin deluge system which will deploy and protect the occupants of the vehicle if it is overrun by fire.

#### **Pop-Up Offices**

My office team has been hosting regular Popup Offices at two locations. The first is as part of the Gordonvale Markets which is the first Saturday on each month in Norman Park and the second is in the main foyer of Mt Sheridan Shopping Centre on the afternoon of the third Wednesday of each month. 

#### MAIN STREET MOSAIC TRAIL

The trail of 22 mosaics starting in Norman Park and continuing on the opposite sides along Norman and Gordon Streets was a project of a community-minded group, The Friends of Gordonvale. The group was formed in the early 1990s with the aim of retaining the character of Gordonvale before it became a suburb of Cairns.

The mosaics tell stories of the area from the Yidinji tribe and their creation legend of Djarragun (Walsh's Pyramid), to early traders, to the development of a sugar industry. #### Carey's Billiard Saloon

Bridget Bourke was a 20-year-old servant when she married 24-year-old labourer Michael Carey in Rockhampton on 22 July 1888. Both were natives of Tipperary, Ireland. They came north via Mareeba and eventually settled in the Nelson area (Gordonvale) in 1898. Bridget was widowed in June 1911 when Michael died in Nelson.

Bridget remarried in April 1913 to John Joseph

McCarthy, a farmer at Meringa. McCarthy was 25. John deserted Bridget in 1924 and they were divorced in 1948 when Bridget was living in Coorparoo, Brisbane.

She died, aged 86, in July 1950 in Gordonvale. Bridget was described in the Cairns Post as 'a very well-known identity in Gordonvale and was one of the early pioneers in the district'.

Bridget and Michael bought property along Norman St, and after his death, Bridget managed the properties, one of them housing the Billiard Saloon. After her death the Commonwealth Bank purchased the property known as Carey's Corner (Norman and Gordon Sts, considered one of the best sites in Gordonvale) for £10 000 from one of her daughters.

The name 'Carey's Corner' can be seen on the building that for many decades was the site of the Popular Newsagency.

Bridget and Michael had 11 children (not all survived past childhood) and have many descendants, some still living in the far north. Bridget's life was commemorated in the Ghosts of Gordonvale Cemetery in 2020.

#### Have you had your healthy brain check?

Our understanding of dementia is changing rapidly and in a good way.

Only last year it was announced for the first time that dementia is preventable in nearly half of all cases (Lancet). This was a complete turnaround from previous thinking and is reassuring given that it is now the leading cause of death in Australia and the world.

Dementia is more than a memory problem. Dementia is a progressive, global life-limiting condition that involves generalised brain degeneration which affects people in different ways and has many different forms. Alzheimers' dementia accounts for the majority, followed by vascular.

It is never too late to address the modifiable risk factors associated with dementia (see diagram) which include diabetes, alcohol use, social isolation and sleep deficiency. Early diagnosis is associated with better outcomes and access to geriatricians in our area is good.

Preventing or delaying progress of dementia includes such things as correcting hearing and vision problems, treating depression, giving up smoking, reducing alcohol intake and increasing fitness. Medications can also slow the progress of dementia.

At our 75 years and over health checks we do a healthy brain check, but could you be having yours earlier?




