Gordonvale-raised jockey Bailie Baker is making her mark on the racing world, with a growing list of achievements.

Her first career win came earlier this year at Beaudesert, followed by a major highlight —

winning the Birdsville Cup, one of Australia's most iconic outback races. The victory confirmed what many already knew: Bailie is a rising talent with a big future ahead.

Horse racing runs deep in her family. Bailie's love for the sport was nurtured by the strong Baker family legacy in racing, with her father, Glen Baker, a respected trainer, playing a key role in shaping her passion and skills. This rich family background has provided a solid foundation that Bailie continues to build on with every ride.

Currently apprenticed to highly regarded trainer Adam Campton, Bailie has embraced the opportunity to learn from his expertise.

Bailie is a proud First Nations woman, connected to the Malanbarra Yidinji people through her maternal grandmother, and to the Kuku Djungan and Guugu Yimithirr peoples through her maternal grandfather. These cultural ties are an important part of her identity, giving her strength and grounding both on and off the track.

Although no longer based in Gordonvale, Bailie's connection to her hometown remains strong. She says she still misses Gordonvale, knowing it will always be home. Her return to ride in the Gordonvale Cup will be a meaningful moment — one that brings her back to the people and place where her journey first began.

Bailie hopes her journey and success go beyond horse racing, inspiring others in any sport or walk of life to believe in themselves. She shows that with hard work, trust in the process, and determination, great things can be achieved.



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THE MULGRAVE CATCHMENT- RIPERIAN RESTORATION RECOVERY PROJECT

The Queensland Government's Natural Resources Recovery Program (NRRP) provides funding to help restore soils, and native vegetation.

Greening Australia was a successful applicant in the latest funding round with a Mulgrave Catchment project that meets the goals of the NRRP. This is to increase

the potential of the state's natural resources and promote economic benefits in regional communities.

The Mulgrave Catchment – Riparian Restoration Recovery Project will:

- stabilise eroding riverbanks and riparian areas in the Mulgrave Catchment through soft engineering, rock stabilization, and revegetation works
- consult, collaborate and work with Traditional Owner groups in the delivery of the project
- undertake numerous community engagement activities including eight community tree planting days

Current key project partners are the Mulgrave Landcare and Catchment Group for tree supply, the Madjandji Aboriginal Corporation to plant trees, and the Cairns River Improvement Trust to undertake streambank stablisation works. Support from local contractors is provided for site preparation and earthworks. On-ground activities have started with landholders in Aloomba, Deeral, and Gordonvale. So far community members have assisted in the installation of nearly 2,600 native trees in riparian areas.

There is opportunity for more landholders in the Mulgrave River catchment to be involved as the project runs from 2024 to 2028. Greening Australia can help prevent the loss of soil from your land. STREETS AHEAD

This column provides a background to the streets and infrastructure of Gordonvale and who or what they were named after Column compiled by Julie Amadio- Mulgrave Shire Historical Society

Mc Nab Road

Mc Nab Road is 12km south of Gordonvale off the Bruce Highway. The road is named after Adam Galbraith Mc Nab who was born in Scotland in 1866. He immigrated to Bundaberg Australia in 1887 on the ship 'Earl Granville'. He settled in the Aloomba area, bought farming land on what is now Mc Nab Road and was one of the earliest suppliers of sugarcane to the Mulgrave Mill. In 1897, only a year after the mill had commenced crushing, he had sent 468 tons of cane to be processed.

Adam married Christina Petersen in 1903. Christina was the daughter of Aloomba identity Niels Petersen who has a street named after him in Aloomba. Christina and Adam Mc Nab had seven children: William John, Annie, Jessie, Adam (jnr), Mary, Sophia, and Thomas. All the children attended Aloomba school. Unfortunately, Adam (jnr) died at four years of age due to illness.

The McNab family lived on the corner of Cowton and Assman Road Aloomba. In the 1927 cyclone, their roof was completely blown off and landed down the road but was able to be reattached. After some time, they built a new home on the same site. In 1933, Christina and Adam moved to Atherton to retire, taking their two youngest children Sophia and Thomas with them. William John was left to run the farm, while Annie, Jessie and Mary had all married and had their own families.

A big celebration was held by the Aloomba community to acknowledge Adam Mc Nab's contribution to the area.

Adam Mc Nab died in 1940 and Christina Mc Nab died in1945 and both are buried in the Atherton Rockley Road Cemetery Memorials.

Sophia Mc Nab married James Alfred Thurston in 1940 in Atherton, and they had five children: Marion, John, Christine and twin girls Carolyn and Elaine. Sophia had bought sixty acres of cane land from her parents and eventually the family moved into the Mc Nab farmhouse on Assman Road.

The children of Sophia and James were all born in the Gordonvale Hospital and attended Meerawa school near Aloomba. James Thurston was stationed in Townsville during WW2, so a lot of the workload was placed on Sophia. She would take the horse and dray to Aloomba to pick up supplies. The families' meat order was brought out from Cairns by rail. It was packed in an ice chest and would arrive at the Quingillli railway siding near Meerawa for them and other families to collect. John Thurston remembers a time when his Mum and their neighbour Mrs. Prestipino were cutting and loading cane to get it to the mill as the cane cutters did not show up.

On completion of his military service, James obtained a sixty-acre portion of land near Sophia's through the Soldier Settlement Scheme. In between the two farms there were sixty acres of virgin scrub that John Thurston cleared and developed into cane land and a few years later John bought his mother's sixty-acre farm. After some time, all three farms were sold to Robert Rossi.

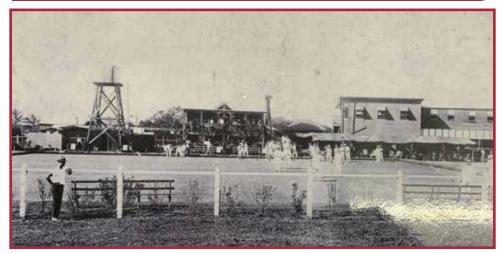
Sophia and James had a new house built by Dall 'Alba & Morris Builders in Cleland Street Gordonvale and spent their retirement years there. Sophia Thurston (nee Mc Nab) died aged seventy-nine in 1994, and James Thurston died aged seventy-seven in 1987, and both are buried in Gordonvale cemetery.

Cairns Post Friday 2 October 1925

GORDONVALE HOSPITAL RALL.

(Contributed.)

The fancy dress ball arranged by Mrs. O'Neill and Mr. V. Owens was perhaps the most successful and brilliant of its kind held in Gordonvale during the present year, and the Memorial Hospital will benefit by an additional 165. The Nelson Hall was completely altered in appearance by fresh and decorative arrangements.

Cairns Post Saturday 3 October 1925

Gordonvale Traffic Bridge.

It is very pleasing to note that the complaint regarding the above has received attention (writes our Gordon-vale correspondent). Several planks have been renewed, although there are several more which, in the course of a few months, will be rotted away with the approaching wet season. However, seeing that the council is under very heavy and increasing expenditure, it is satisfactory to see a little attention is being distributed around.

Cairns Post Tuesday 13 October 1925

Gordonvale State School.

Tickets are out for a children's fancy dress ball, to be held in the Federal Hall on Saturday, 17th inst. This function is being organised for the purpose of raising funds to pay for a piano which the committee recently purchased for the State school. There have already been held two socials, which brought in £28 nct. and direct giving resulted in the sum of £45 coming to hand. As about £60 is 'still needed to complete the purchase, it is hoped that the response on Saturday next will be such that further efforts by the committee and the many ladies who help will be reduced to a minimum.

Cairns Post Friday 30 October 1925

GORDONVALE NOTES

Oct. 28.
On Tuesday last a motor car driven by Mr. A. Lock collided with a push "bike." ridden by Mr. George Zargus, when the latter was returning home from cutting at Meringa. Mr. Zargus was thrown to the ground, and his "bike" carried along some distance, and somewhat damaged. Mr. Zargus returned to his home, where he will be confined for a day or two.

What surprised me most on the day were the incredulous gentlemen who wanted

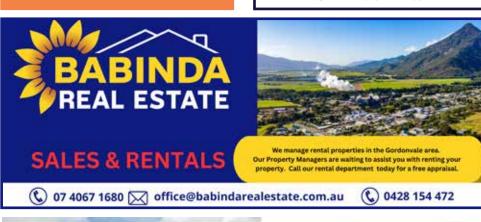
to know if there was another election looming because what else would I be doing out in Gordonvale. These blunt, pointed statements were a lesson to every politician.

Guests travelled from all over Queensland and NSW for the occasion. Photos, newspaper clippings, woodworking projects, trophies, and medals were exhibited—capturing Bill's many chapters of life. His sister Rhoda (96) shared a poem written by nephew Frank.

A highlight was the tribute by Kevin Murgatroyd, first president of Pyramid Residential Care Centre (PRCC) in Gordonvale, who thanked Bill for his instrumental role in the centre's early development 55 years ago.

Bill's six great-grandchildren helped him cut the cake, capping off a heartfelt celebration.

Later, on his actual birthday, friends and family gathered again for a morning tea, where Rhoda's homemade cake was

crowned with 100 candles—lit by the great-grandkids

Born on August 17, 1925, in Finch Hatton, Bill was the fourth child of Fred and Dulcie Honeywell. He grew up on a cane farm before marrying Betty in 1949. Together, they raised three children—Mavis, Sandra, and Graeme. Bill and Betty made their long-term family home in Sheppard Street, Gordonvale—a convenient location, as Bill worked as an engineer at the Mulgrave Central Mill for four decades until retirement. After retirement, Bill discovered a passion for running, competing in Masters Games across Australia and New Zealand. He

became a cult hero in Gordonvale for his participation in the Great Pyramid Race, which he competed in 12 times from age 67 to 80. His best time was 1 hour 46 minutes, and he proudly collected several trophies from this race.

He also had the honour of being a torch bearer in the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

Bill and Betty celebrated 70 years of marriage in 2019. Betty passed away in 2023, leaving behind a legacy of love.

Bill now has three grandchildren and six great-grandchildren—and a life story that continues to inspire.

Norman Park

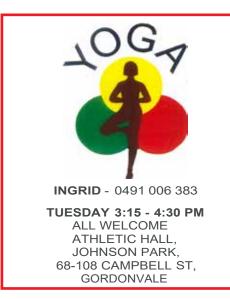
Norman Park

In circa 1897 a layout plan was devised by the Lands Administration Board for the new township of Nelson (now Gordonvale). At its heart was a park reserve surrounded on three sides by the civic centre of the town and on the fourth side was the Mulgrave Mill and its tramway stop, which later became the railway station.

Norman Park known to most people as simply the park, has seen most of the important events of the township. It was named after the Governor of Queensland in the 1890s, Sir Henry Wylie Norman, as was its western boundary Norman Street.

Sporting and many fund-raising events, carnivals, bazaars etc. were held in the park. The annual ambulance carnival, when local brigades had to do their own fundraising, was always a popular affair with many attractions including wood chopping events. When the circus came to town the park was the logical place to set up, at this time it was a much more open space. Some of the smaller variety reviews with their own tents also performed there.

Gordonvale in earlier times had its own brass band and they would play in a corner of the park on Saturday nights.





CLEAN UP CREW STOPS RUBBISH REACHING REEF

Despite grey skies and the threat of rain, a committed group of volunteers braved the weather to take part in a local clean-up along the Bungara Heritage Trail to Greenpatch Campground in Gordonvale. The event saw members of Mulgrave Landcare Catchment Group working alongside the DMYAC (Dulabed Malanbarra Yidinji Aboriginal Corporation) / Jawajawa Rangers, Cairns Regional Council's Cheryl Prestipino, and other community members.

Together, they removed a wide variety of litter from the area, including cigarette butts, food packaging, bottles, cans, abandoned tents, and other camping gear. Their efforts have helped stop a significant amount of rubbish from entering the Mulgrave River and making its way to the ocean, where it could pose a threat to marine life and the Great Barrier Reef.

The clean-up was part of Clean Up Cairns,

an annual Cairns Regional Council initiative inviting locals to take part in litter clean-ups every weekend throughout September. Since 2019, the program has seen 1,173 community members volunteer at 73 clean-up events.

As the saying goes, a little litter is a big problem. Every piece left behind has the potential to end up in our waterways, threatening our creeks, beaches, and the fragile reef ecosystem. We can all play a part in protecting the natural beauty of Gordonvale and beyond.

SWIM PROGRAM IS THRIVING AT AQUATIC CENTRE

The Gordonvale Aquatic Centre, proudly operated by Marlin Coast Swimming and Fitness, is making waves in the local community with its year-round swimming program.

Boasting a 25-metre indoor heated pool, the facility is perfectly equipped to support swimmers of all ages and skill levels. The covered grandstand also offers a comfortable space for parents and carers to watch lessons out of the sun and rain.

Two years ago, the centre had no children enrolled in swim classes. Today, the swim school has grown to over 70 enthusiastic young swimmers, supported by five highly credentialled instructors. The program now

caters to children from babies to 15 years of age, offering everything from learn-to-swim lessons to squad training.

Swim School Coordinator Kiara Cutler and Head Lifeguard Lance Deal say they are thrilled with the growth and community support. Due to high demand, a waiting list is currently in place—but the team hopes to expand offerings soon as more staff are brought on board.

Classes are currently held on Wednesday afternoons, with a strong focus on mastering swimming fundamentals before progressing to more advanced techniques. All children receive a free swimming assessment to ensure they are placed in the correct level.

Learn-to-swim classes are kept small—no more than four children per group—to ensure personalised attention. The centre also accepts SwimStart vouchers, which provide up to \$150 towards swimming lessons for eligible children aged 0 to 4. Local GP and avid swimmer Dr Lisa Fraser is also encouraging families to get involved. "Every Australian child deserves the right to swim and build a positive relationship with water before starting school," she says. "It's vital for their physical and mental health, and for the future wellbeing of our community. In a part of Australia where water sports are popular, swimming literacy plays an important role in preventing drownings. "

The program is inclusive and designed to cater to a variety of learning needs and abilities, ensuring every child has the opportunity to learn safely and confidently. It was my great pleasure to officially open the New 10-bed youth residential rehabilitation service on Mt Peter Road in Edmonton.

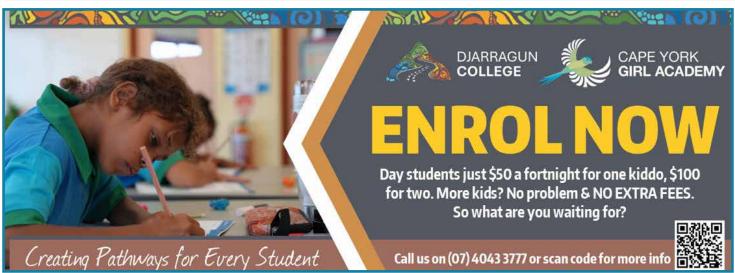

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CAIRNS WATER SECURITY STAGE 1 PROJECT UPDATE

Major progress is being made across the Cairns Water Security Stage 1 (CWSS1) project, with works advancing at both the Water Treatment Plant and along the pipeline network.

At the Water Treatment Plant site, construction has entered a new phase with the installation of structural steel roof over the Dissolved Air Flotation and Filtration (DAFF) plant. This marks a critical step in the plant's development. Water integrity testing of the DAFF plant has been successfully completed, and further testing of other concrete structures is ongoing to ensure long-term reliability.

Meanwhile along the 30km pipeline route, more than 11.61 km has now been laid. The first thrust bore under the Bruce Highway has

also been successfully completed. The highway on-ramp closure will remain in place while additional boring and the construction of a services pit take place to support critical infrastructure.

The CWSS1 team is committed to keeping the community informed and minimising disruptions, and we thank you for your patience as we deliver this vital infrastructure for Cairns.
